

## Domestic Abuse

Domestic abuse is rarely a one-off incident, but a pattern of power and control over you. It is any threatening behaviour, violence or abuse between adults who are or have been in a relationship, or between family members.

Domestic abuse can include, but is not limited to:

- coercive control (a pattern of intimidation, degradation, isolation and control with the use or threat of physical or sexual violence)
- psychological and/or emotional abuse
- physical or sexual abuse
- financial abuse
- harassment and stalking
- online or digital abuse



**Coercive or controlling behaviour** does not relate to a single incident, it is a purposeful pattern of incidents that occur over time in order for one individual to exert power, control or coercion over another. Coercive control is effectively controlling behaviour; Acts by an abuser which takes away another person's freedom and ability to have a positive sense of self and worth which results in the victim feeling more dependent on the abuser and then creates an on-going cycle of controlling abuse.

Coercive and controlling behaviour can be particularly difficult to identify when in an abusive relationship and is a relative newly recognised crime, only coming into law with the Serious Crime Act of 2015.

*Coercion and control is a broad umbrella term however here are some common examples of what it may look like:*

- Purposefully isolating a person, or preventing them from socialising with family and friends
- Stopping them from attending work or their place of study, e.g. by limiting their access to transport
- Demeaning and belittling a person, such as telling them they are worthless
- Controlling how much money they have and how they spend it
- Monitoring their activities and movements

- Taking control over aspects of your everyday life, such as where you can go, who you can see, what you can wear and when you can sleep
- Depriving you access to support services, medical advice, attending appointments etc.
- Putting you in fear of doing what you would like to do

## What is Domestic Abuse?

Domestic Abuse as an incident or pattern of incidents of controlling, coercive, threatening, degrading and violent behaviour, including sexual violence.

### Key Characteristics:

- Coercion and Control
- Physical
- Sexual
- Financial
- Psychological
- Harassment/stalking
- Online

### Signs to look out for:

- Low self-esteem
- Feeling that the abuse is their fault when it is not
- Bruising, cuts, broken bones
- Verbal abuse and humiliation in front of other
- Damage to property/home
- Isolation – not seeing friends and family
