EPiC HOPE Harbours are there for everyone. Whether you are struggling with mental health issues or suicidal thoughts, if you have been suicidal historically or recently, if you have lost someone through suicide or even if you just need to talk and share your feelings. With peer-to-peer support and friendly volunteers, the harbours are a safe place, and you will always be made very welcome. No appointment needed.

At the Crisis Harbours, trained and compassionate peer supporters with lived experience offer immediate support if anyone is going through a mental health crisis, including feeling suicidal. They provide a safe alternative to A&E and can help connect people to other support once the immediate crisis has passed.

## Wigan leads the way... The 1st indefinite Domestic Abuse Protection Order to be granted in the country

On 22 August 2025, Manchester and Salford Magistrates Court granted an indefinite **Domestic Abuse Protection Order (DAPO)** to protect an individual from domestic abuse. The application was led by the **Wigan Domestic Abuse Team (DAT)**, who are currently managing the criminal investigation. This indefinite order which has been obtained prior to any conviction is one of the first to be granted in the country.

The Magistrates were deeply concerned by the content of the application, in particular the regularity and extremity of the abuse from the suspect and granted the indefinite order as requested. During proceedings, it was revealed that the perpetrator was employed as a nurse, prompting immediate safeguarding concerns.

Relevant disclosures are also being prepared to inform the perpetrator's employer and safeguarding leads.

### **Strong Multi-Agency Coordination**

This case highlights the strength of multi-agency collaboration in safeguarding vulnerable individuals.

### **Key actions now underway include:**

**Victim welfare** is being prioritised, with updates and support provided directly to the individual, including guidance on reporting any breaches. Referrals to Wigan Council and beyond will be made, triggered by the Domestic Abuse Report.

**Perpetrator compliance** is being enforced through timely visits and service of the order, with all actions documented to ensure accountability.

### **Safeguarding Across Borders**

As the victim resides outside the Greater Manchester area, an **out-of-force referral** is being conducted to ensure continued support and monitoring. This demonstrates the importance of cross-border cooperation in protecting individuals at risk.



# The Power of Partnership Working - Multi-Agency Operation to target Cuckooing and county lines

On **15th May 2025**, a coordinated multi-agency initiative took place across the Wigan Borough as part of **Operation Avro**, led by Greater Manchester Police (GMP) they were joined by Keyworkers **Vicki Worby** and **Chris Walker** from the **Complex Dependency Team**, alongside colleagues from the **Community Resilience Team** and **Neighbourhood Tenancy Team (Housing)**, to deliver targeted visits to vulnerable individuals and households.

**Strategic Objectives of the Operation-** The day's activity was underpinned by a clear set of objectives:

## **Safeguarding & Risk Reduction**

Identifying individuals at risk, conducting on-site assessments, and making immediate referrals to support services including mental health and social care.

## **Enforcement & Disruption**

Taking appropriate enforcement action to disrupt criminal activity and gather intelligence for ongoing investigations.

## **Community Engagement & Reassurance**

Raising awareness of exploitation risks and providing visible reassurance in high-risk areas.

## **Intelligence Gathering & Information Sharing**

Facilitating real-time intelligence exchange between agencies and identifying emerging concerns.

## **Multi-Agency Collaboration**

Strengthening partnership working and promoting joint decision-making for improved safeguarding outcomes.

## **Efficiency & Coordination**

Reducing duplication through joint visits and aligning efforts with existing partner activity.

## **Sustainable Safeguarding Measures**

Establishing longer-term support plans and tracking outcomes to inform future interventions.

**Operational Highlights** - Two vehicles were deployed to cover the **East and West** of the district and a total of **10 addresses** were visited across the borough. The visits enabled direct safeguarding interventions, new referrals for housing, mental health, substance misuse and offending support and enhanced information sharing between agencies.

## **Impact and Feedback**

A Neighbourhood Sergeant involved in the operation shared their appreciation:

*"I wanted to extend my thanks for your support last Thursday. Your attendance and engagement were instrumental in ensuring the day ran smoothly."*

This operation exemplifies the power of partnership working in safeguarding adults at risk and disrupting exploitation in our communities.

## The Prevention Hub Team

The Prevention Hub transferred to Adult Social Care in May this year and now forms part of the Safeguarding Team (MAPPT). This transition reflects a natural alignment with Adult Social Care as the Prevention Hub's role is centred on safeguarding adults, addressing vulnerability, prevention, and crisis intervention. Additionally, the team focuses on demand reduction and works closely with several partner agencies including Greater Manchester Police, Wroughtington Wigan and Leigh NHS Foundation Trust (WWL) and North West Ambulance Service (NWAS) to address repeat demand.

The Prevention Hub is based at Wigan Police Station and is made up of an Operational Manager, seven keyworkers and a Business Support Officer. The keyworkers aim to respond to referrals within 72 hours. They may address different needs such as mental health, substance misuse, physical health concerns, housing, financial issues, offending, amongst other areas.

The Prevention Hub does not receive direct referrals. All referrals are made through agreed pathways such as Multi Agency Public Protection Team (MAPPT), the Eyes and Ears process and other specialised channels.

One of the Prevention Hub's most effective areas of work is the Risk and Complexity Workstream, developed in partnership with the Safeguarding Team (MAPPT). Through this joint approach, the Prevention Hub have and continue to support individuals who may not meet Care Act thresholds, but who face vulnerabilities and complexities.

The Prevention Hub also work with adults who have been identified as A&E repeat presentations, NWAS High Intensity Users and GMP repeat demand (adult missing from homes and vulnerable adult incidents). The aim of these workstreams is to establish unmet needs of the individuals identified, coordinate support that reduces reliance on these services and prevent future demand, whilst in turn contributing to the reduction of demand on Adult Social Care's front door.

Being part of Adult Social Care strengthens the ability to focus on early intervention and prevention, while also helping to reduce current and/or future demand on Adult Social Care. Furthermore, delivering more sustainable and positive outcomes for the people the team support.

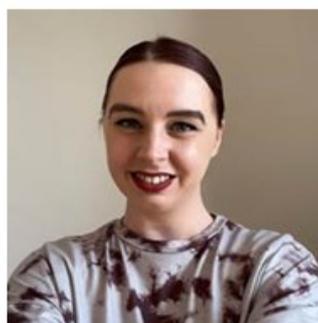


## Hear from some of the Prevention Hub Team Members



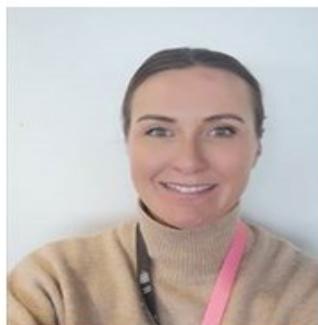

## Special Recognition Award Presented to Heathside Staff Team

On the 28th of April 2025 a member of staff from Heathside was asked to work, she wasn't rostered but went in to support the team. Whilst in work the member of staff began to feel unwell and was waiting to be taken by her partner to A&E on the advice of the ambulance service. Whilst waiting and being supported by the team, the member of staff had a heart attack and stopped breathing. The team at Heathside launched into action and worked together to commence CPR and one of the staff ran to the local Spar shop to get a defibrillator. The team worked on the member of staff for over 20 minutes and were able to get a pulse after using the defibrillator machine.

Following arrival of the ambulance and further treatment on site the staff member was transported to Salford Royal and designated as critical. Due to the rapid response of the team the lady has made a good recovery and was discharged a few days later. This was very much attributed to the care she had received from the staff team and their quick thinking. The Staff member visited Heathside after being discharged from hospital to thank everyone for saving her life.

The staff member recognises that she could have been home alone when she had the heart attack and is grateful for the care and support received.

Natalie, Registered Manager at Heathside, accepted the Special Recognition Award on behalf of the Heathside Team.
